<p>1907 Wyatt Pavilion Theatre, one of the campus' first buildings, was named for Fred Sheldon Wyatt, an assistant to the UC Davis chancellor and volunteer girls and endowments officer who helped save the former livestock judging pavilion and give it new life as an Elizabethan theatre.</p>	<p>1927 Walker Hall, named after Harry Bruce Walker, chair of agricultural engineering, inventor of agricultural production equipment.</p>	<p>1928 Hart Hall, named after George H. Hart, chair of animal science and dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine.</p>	<p>1940 Shields Library, named after Samuel Henry Shields for his family's gracious donations for the improvement of many UC campuses. Shields, often called the "father of the UC Davis campus," who drafted the 1945 legislation that created the University Farm School, later to become UC Davis.</p>	<p>1949 Haring Hall, named after Clarence M. Haring, founding dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine.</p>	<p>1949 Hunt Hall, named after Forsyth Hunt, dean of the College of Agriculture (1912-1920, 1921-1923).</p>	<p>1952 Cowell Student Health Center, named after Samuel Henry Cowell for his family's gracious donations for the improvement of many UC campuses.</p>	<p>1958 Robbins Hall, named after Wilfred William Robbins, professor of botany and key contributor to the success of the sugar beet industry in California.</p>	<p>1959 Hoagland Hall, named after Dennis Roberts Hoagland, head of the Division of Plant Nutrition at UC Berkeley and chair of the Department of Botany.</p>	<p>1960 Gilmore Hall, named after John Washington Gilmore, professor of agronomy.</p>	<p>1960 Malcolm Hall, named after Robert K. Malcolm, a California pioneer in the business of large-scale farming.</p>	<p>1963 Olson Hall, named after Gus Olson, a Clarksville farmer and businessman who served on the university's Board of Regents.</p>	<p>1963 Byerson Hall, named after Knowles A. Byerson, noted professor of horticulture and past dean of the College of Agriculture (1930-52) and vice president of the university (1945-1922) helped develop the Farm School into a full four-year university.</p>	<p>1965 Regan Hall, named after faculty members William Michael Regan and Susan Frances Cobb Regan. William, an expert on dairy cattle breeding, was known throughout California for his devoted promotion of the Agricultural Extension Service and Susan was the first woman faculty member and first dean of women.</p>	<p>1966 Bainer Hall, named after Roy Bainer, agricultural engineer and founding dean of the Department of English (1928-1934), the Division of Language and Literature (1934-1932) and the Department of English, Dramatic Art and Speech (1932-1935).</p>

Veilmeyer, professor of water science and leader in research on plant-soil-water relationships.</p>	<p>1949 Everson Hall, named after Fred Everson, for her work in nutrition studies and the effects of manganese in the human diet.</p>	<p>1952 Asmundson Hall, named after avian scientist Nigita Samundson for his pioneering work in poultry genetics.</p>	<p>1959 Voorhes Hall, named after Edwin Coburn Voorhes, assistant to the dean of the College of Agriculture.</p>	<p>1959 Wickson Hall, named after Edward J. Wickson, dean of agriculture, program that became the Division of Agricultural Education at Davis.</p>	<p>1960 Hixby Hall, named after Fred Hathaway Hixby, a Long Beach rancher and livestock breeder who created a program that broadened opportunities for agricultural graduates.</p>	<p>1961 Freeborn Hall, named after Stanley Burton Freeborn, a medical entomologist who became UC Davis' first chancellor.</p>	<p>1963 Sprout Hall, named after Robert Gordon Sprout, the first UC alumnus to become president of the University of California.</p>	<p>1965 Crocker Nuclear Lab, named after San Francisco banker William Henry Crocker, who served 1908-37 on the UC Board of Regents, the last 11 years as chair.</p>	<p>1965 Mann Laboratory, named after professor Louis K. Mann for his research in plant genetics and physiology.</p>	<p>1966 Mtrak Hall, named after Emil M. Mtrak, a food scientist and microbiologist who became UC Davis' second chancellor, overseeing rapid campus growth during 1959-69.</p>	<p>1967 Thille Hall, named after Albert J. Thille, a 1912 alumnus and Santa Paula farmer who contributed to student loans and scholarships, water research and the arboretum.</p>

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
